Dear Friends in Christ,

For all the experiences I've had in my life, I consider myself quite blessed. I've lived in small towns, very small towns, medium-sized cities, suburbs, rural towns, and urban areas. I've had friends, acquaintances and co-workers from all walks of life. I've never really understood divisions between people. Even in today's political climate – no matter what side you're drawn to, I still believe that we are called to love our neighbors because that is what Jesus teaches us.

In my hometown the city is divided by the river into Frenchtown to the south and the rest of the city. It's an arbitrary line as much of the area was "founded" by French fur traders and priests as early as the 1660s. However, all of that becomes irrelevant when we read further into the history of the area and realize that artifacts from around 5000 BCE can be found that belong to the Copper Culture indigenous peoples. Many places are divided like this because when they were "settled" the winning ethnic group claimed the land in their name. For better or worse. It happens all around the world. Urban areas are *still* feeling the effects of redlining* today.

Jesus had this really great way of crossing imagined boundaries. He would go to places that others didn't expect him to go. He would hang out with "undesirable" or "unworthy" people. Of course, that term is dependent on the lens through which you look at people. The Jesus lens is much different than the human lens.

This Lenten season, we have been journeying through Luke's gospel. We've been looking at polarities and dichotomies with the intention of being transformed by the good news we see there. We have talked about intention and action, stranger and neighbor and faith and works. We have been talking about how to live our lives in such a way that we can make it all work together. We have seen that things are not as different as they seem. The arbitrary lines that are drawn are blurred by Jesus.

When Pastor Vivian, Pastor Stephen and I sat down to plan Lenten worship, we found this series and decided that it would be a good way to re-introduce our congregations and, perhaps, get us to work together because we have so much in common as siblings in Christ. I believe we all have a lot to learn from each other. We all have different gifts. In much the same way that the Samaritan taught others about being a neighbor and Mary taught Martha about what is best.

This all leads me to wonder what Jesus would have to say. Do we trust him? Would he teach a parable about us? I don't have an answer. But I will end here to allow you all to ponder our Lenten lessons.

I appreciate the many other ways I see community happening around the church - through the different special projects, committees and events. And, I really appreciate how much the HTWA community does for the broader community around us. Keep it up - and let me know how music can assist in these visions.
